My friend Bonnie, a member of Cheriton UMC, showed me a card with Cheriton's breakthrough prayer when we had lunch last Monday. Cheriton had worked "seaside to bayside" into their prayer, which is appropriate if you know Seaside and Bayside roads on the Eastern Shore.

That's the kind of thing we may be encouraged to incorporate into the breakthrough prayer that we'll write at our workshop Saturday, April 20, 10 a.m.-noon. Local references are encouraged for such prayers, so please be thinking about local things we may want to reference in our prayer.

As I said in a post on Facebook last week, Kristin Fogle, one of our workshop facilitators from Haygood UMC, has asked if power point will be available that day, so if someone can help with this, please let the office or me know. Kristin's request made me realize that we may want to try to stream the workshop for any who can't attend. If you'd like to participate online, please let me know so I can be intentional about ensuring that that's available.

This workshop is about deepening our life together in God, so I hope everyone will participate. The prayer that we'll write will be used in worship the next morning and we'll be praying it together on a regular basis after that. This prayer will be our way of unleashing the Holy Spirit at Oaklette and asking God to do what only God can do.

Last Monday, I helped Duane Johnstone, who was volunteering at our food pantry, carry a couple of bags to a car. The car's driver was named Ashley, and when she got out of her car to open her back door, I noticed that she was wearing two pins, one with the picture of a young woman and the other with a picture of two young children. I asked about the pins and Ashley said, "They were some of my friends. Their house caught fire in Portsmouth last month and they didn't make it out." Duane and I told Ashley we were sorry to hear that, and I asked Ashley how she was doing. She said she was okay. I was sorry to hear Ashley's news, but I'm happy that we have the chance to talk to folks who come to the food pantry. It reminds me of members of Cheriton United Methodist Church who used to volunteer with the Food Bank in Cape Charles 20 years ago. Our job then was registration, and because we helped monthly, we got to know clients. One client was named Richard Nixon and another was named Edward G. Robinson. There was also a woman named Annie who was the spitting image of an art critic I used to work with at Port Folio magazine. I was glad then that we got to build relationships then in the name of Jesus Christ and I'm glad that the food pantry at Oaklette gives us an opportunity to do so.

Ashley told Duane and me that she has a church – Solid Rock Fellowship in Hickory. Another client last Monday, Jeannette, told me that she plans to join us in worship or Bible study sometime when her work at an assisted-living facility in Great Bridge allows.

Oaklette also has an opportunity to build relationships to Jesus' name with our Girl Scout Troop. The troop sponsors pop-up markets the first Saturday of the month, noon-4, at the church. Lots of vendors come out. When I went by last Saturday, one vendor, Greene, saw a ship's logo on my mock turtleneck and asked me how long I had served in the military. He served on the George H.W. Bush for seven years and we talked about the fact that the flight deck of an aircraft carrier is the most dangerous place in the world to work, which was something I'd noted in Bible study two days before. Greene told me to have a blessed day as we said goodbye. Sitting across from Greene was Emily, an author who has a greeting spelled out in Scrabble tiles. I love both books and Scrabble, which gave Emily and me some common ground. Emily is more into sci-fi and fantasy than I am, but it was good to make her acquaintance and Greene's last Saturday and Ashley's and Jeannette's last Monday.

Last Sunday we heard that Jesus said in John 20:21, "As the Father sends me, I am sending you." He then breathed on the disciples and told them, "Receive the Holy Spirit." Like the disciples, we've received the Holy Spirit and are sent by Jesus as the Father sent him. This compels us into our communities to make and sustain relationships for Jesus Christ. This is a frightening prospect for many of us, but we can go in numbers and we can also greet people like Ashley, Jeannette, Greene, Emily, and our Girl Scouts when they come to Oaklette. Perhaps we can discuss at and before next month's church council meeting how we can get to know such guests. The Girls Scout's next pop-up S I

market is May 4. I'd be there if I didn't have reserves in Norfolk that weekend, but I invite everyone
else to go. Truth be told, I'm the world's worst consumer. Greene and his family were selling t-shirt
and Emily was selling books and other vendors were selling goods from jewelry to candles to donuts.
