Wow. Time flies. Two months ago, on Christ the King Sunday, I asked how Oaklette wants to make the Gospel of Jesus Christ real for all people through worship, outreach, and education in 2025. In the time since, I've shared some suggestions on Facebook and at an administrative team meeting and would like to share them here now.

In terms of education, I've said that I'd like to teach Amy-Jill Levine's *Entering the Passion of Jesus* as a Lenten study. This study starts during Sunday school on March 2 and three people have signed up so far. I hope more will join us and I've asked that anyone interested in joining notify the church office by Feb. 3 so that we can order books.

That's my suggestion for education in the first quarter of 2025. In the second quarter, I'd like for us to study *Get Their Name: Grow Your Church by Building New Relationships* by Bob Farr, Doug Anderson, and Kay Kotan. This title was recommended by the Possibilities Report developed for Oaklette by the Coastal Virginia District in July 2022. The committee on nominations and lay leadership will work on planning this four-week study when it meets Feb. 11.

For the third quarter of 2025, I'd like to offer a study of the United Methodist Social Principles, since an updated version will be published on June 17. For the last quarter, I'd like to offer an Advent study, possibly Magrey deVega's *The Christmas Letters*, which looks at the Epistles and was published last year. All of these are just suggestions; I'm open to other ideas and would like to hear them.

In terms of outreach, I'd like to see us join in a community project for Martin Luther King Day next January. This has always been a goal of mine, and I look forward to finding out what our options are. Other ideas I have on the back burner are joining community events for Earth Day and possibly a couple of fourth-quarter events I joined last year, such as the National Alliance on Mental Illness and Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walks at the Virginia Beach oceanfront. The latter featured a team from the Indian River Y, which Oaklette supports with mission funds. A third-quarter option has just occurred to me: National Night Out, an annual event that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie. This usually takes place on the first Tuesday in August, which means Aug. 5 for 2025. I went to the National Night Out at Lakeside Park in 2023 and connected with ForKids there. I remember at least one church – maybe Great Bridge Baptist – had a display. Perhaps Oaklette can provide a witness and presence there this year.

Again, all of these are just suggestions and I'm open to other ideas and eager to hear them. Please let me know where you'd like to see Oaklette make the Gospel of Jesus Christ real for all people through worship, outreach, and education in 2025 and into 2026.

Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how he wanted to be remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."
