During the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year), Christians figuratively follow Jesus into the desert. Just as our Savior spent 40 days fasting and facing temptation, we focus on self-reflection and contrition.

In an 1873 hymn, Claudia Hernaman wrote, "O Lord, throughout these forty days, you prayed and kept the fast. Inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past."

The desert experience of Lent serves a clear purpose, filling us up rather than depleting us. "This is what Lent is meant to be," writes theologian Ron Rolheiser. "Time in the desert to courageously face the chaos and the demons within us and to let God do battle with them through us. The result is that we are purified, made ready, so the intoxicating joy of Easter might then bind us more closely to God and each other."



I have no idea how many frozen packages of chicken drumsticks I gave out at the Community Feed in Berkley on Tuesday. I volunteered 9:30-12:30 and doors opened at 10. Folks were there from the first moment 'til the last, but there was enough down time for me to look at scriptures for our March 5 Ash Wednesday service. Joel 2:1-2, 12-17 is the customary Old Testament reading, but an alternate reading, Isaiah 58:1-12, caught my eye. Starting in verse 3, we read, "You serve your own interest on your fast day and oppress all your workers. You fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with the wicked fist....Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself?. Is this not the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice."

Preaching on this text seems to me a good way to start our observation of Lent for 2025. I hope our service will be even richer this year, as our Blue Christmas service last December was, I felt, richer than the one the year before. I'll add some new elements, in part because I understand our A/V system a little better.

Please join in worship Wednesday at 5:30 p.m. If you'd like to receive ashes earlier that day, please let me know and I'll try to come by your home or office. Remember that Lent gives us an opportunity to examine our relationship with God and to cast out anything that stands in the way of that relationship. As Advent allows us to look at God's vision for the world compared to the way that the world really is, Lent allows us to make similar comparisons on an individual basis.
