# TIM TALK "A Way Forward"

As many of you may already know the Council of Bishops has called a Special Session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church to be held February 23–26, 2019 in St. Louis, Missouri. The purpose will be to receive and act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops. The 32–member Commission was authorized by General Conference 2016 and appointed by the Council of Bishops to examine paragraphs in The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and exploring options to strengthen the unity of the church.



February is not that far away. In less than a year the geography of the United Methodist Church as we have known could be forever changed. The Cabinet (that is, the Bishop and the District Superintendents) have been encouraging every pastor within the Virginia Annual Conference to have a conversation with their congregations concerning the Way Forward

prior to end of this year.

For some within the life of the church the discussion over human sexuality especially within the church's mininstry to the LGBT community has become a very contentious and hot-button issue. I realize that as a pastor it remains in my best interest to remain quiet about these issues because that is what I have been taught the pastor does. However, when I have been directly approached in a one-to-one conversation or within a Bible Study I have made comments. Whether you agree with me or not does not ultimately matter. What matters however is the unloving uncompromising stance churches often take towards anyone who is different from them. Stances such as these are pharisaic in nature; that is; they come accross sounding self-righteous and hypocritical in their approach without concern for the welfare of the people they target.

I believe the church was never intended to be a moral compass; it was instead a means by which God's gracious love and mercy would be distributed to the world. For the most part the church fulfills that purpose; however, on issues such as human sexuality churches

have become notoriously known as hypocritical. Instead of displaying signs of God's peace and mercy, we instead have lifted up voices in angry protest showing nothing but loathing and hatred.

Our bishop, Sharma D. Lewis, has prophesied that regardless of the General Conference's decision, there will be people who will be happy with the outcome and those who won't. Regardless, there will be change.

That is why it is so important for the conversation to begin now; so that when change does occur, we won't be caught off guard. Also I believe it is important that as a church we enter this conversation to see where we need to grow as Christ-followers in displaying our love and grace even when our teachings might not match up with that of the culture.

During the month of October I am committing three of my Sunday Morning Messages to what I am calling "Messy Grace." [SEE SERMONS FOR OCTOBER FOR DETAILS.] Throughout those three Sunday Worship experiences we will explore the messiness that comes from being the church that offers God's grace and love to all regardless



of who they are. As my backdrop I am going to be using two sources. The first will be the three proposals The Way Forward Commission has offered to the Council of Bishops as well as the commission's proposal that the Council of Bishops is recommending. The other source is what I would call a very conservative but timely book on ministry to the LGBT

community entiled Messy Grace. I have chosen this source not because I agree with it (in fact, at points, I disagree); I have chosen it because I want to better understand their arguments so that I can all the more faithfully live a life that I believe best examplifies the love and mercy of my Savior. Again, let me reiterate; I know how difficult this discussion is for people on both sides of the discussion. None of us owns a hold on the corner of the market when it comes to God's grace. God's grace, simply put, is God's grace.

On Thursday November 9<sup>th</sup> the Rev. Tom Berlin pastor of Floris UMC in northern Virginia and a member of the Comission for A Way Forward will be on the Elizabeth River District to further share with us the work of the commission in preparation for February's General Conference. He will be speaking to laity at Heritage UMC (next to Virginia Weselyan University on Baker Road) at 7:00 PM. Beside having a willing and open heart to join with me in worship during the month of October I would greatly encourage you to attend this important event with Rev. Berlin as well.






## FREE MOVIE NIGHT SATURDAY, OCTOBER 13, 2018 7:00 – 9:00 pm – PAVILION "Flywheel"
