

CHRISTIAN FLAG — Dating to the early 20th century, the Christian flag represents all of Christianity, though it's been used primarily in the Americas and Africa. The red Latin cross symbolizes Jesus' blood shed on Calvary to grant us eternal life. The blue background represents Christ's faithfulness even unto death, as well as our baptism into Christ. The white field signifies Jesus' purity, nonviolence and surrender to God's will, plus the peace we gain by surrendering ourselves to Christ.



I'm going for a walk Oct. 5, a good walk. I'm taking part in the I AM NAMI Walk at the Oceanfront. NAMI is the National Alliance on Mental illness, and I learned about the I AM NAMI Walk at Coffee with a Counselor and a Cop Sept. 18. The walk starts at 14<sup>th</sup> Street and goes up to 24<sup>th</sup> Street on the Boardwalk and then returns to 14th street via the beach. Organizers chose this route to show how coping with mental health can be as easy as walking on a boardwalk or as hard as walking on sand.

The I AM NAMI Walk flyer, which I've shared on Facebook and posted outside my office, says that the goal of the walk is to raise awareness and funds for free support groups, free adult and youth educational classes, and free programs and presentations in Chesapeake, Norfolk, Portsmouth, Virginia Beach, and the Eastern Shore. Please let me know if you'd like to walk, too, or to come out and cheer participants. I've been hoping to connect with NAMI since attending the "Who is My Neighbor?" lunch lab at Annual Conference. NAMI works with churches through the FaithNet program, and I look forward to learning and sharing more.

Considering the use of "I AM" in the Bible, the name of the walk is intriguing. Exodus 3:13-14 reads, "But Moses said to God, 'If I come to the Israelites and say to them, "The God of your ancestors has sent me to you," and they ask me, "What is his name?" what shall I say to them?' God said to Moses, 'I am who I am.' He said further, 'Thus you shall say to the Israelites, "I am has sent me to you." Think, too, of John 6:35, where Jesus says, "I am the bread of life"; and of John 14: 6, where he says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life"; and of John 18:3-9, which reads,

"So Judas brought a detachment of soldiers together with police from the chief priests and the Pharisees, and they came there with lanterns and torches and weapons. Then Jesus, knowing all that was to happen to him, came forward and asked them, 'For whom are you looking?' They answered, 'Jesus of Nazareth.' Jesus replied, 'I am he.' Judas, who betrayed him, was standing with them. When Jesus said to them, 'I am he', they stepped back and fell to the ground. Again he asked them, 'For whom are you looking?' And they said, 'Jesus of Nazareth.' Jesus answered, 'I told you that I am he. So if you are looking for me, let these men go."

The name of the walk could be a coincidence, and if so, it's a good one.
